

The Bad Guys Win

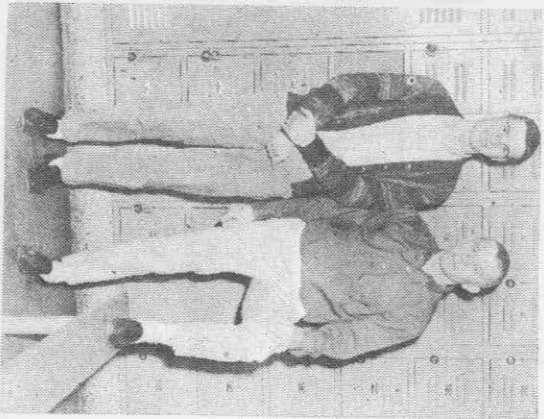

Manuel, Damon Set Royal Records

As the old maxim goes, "records are made to be broken," and this track season presents no exceptions. Already this year John Uelses, vaulting 16 feet 1/4 inch, and Gary Gubner, putting the shot 63 feet 10 1/4 inches, have broken and established world indoor records in their respective events. These new records alone may not seem over-fascinating, but for Southwest fans it has a concurrent significance for two of our athletes have turned in record breaking performances in the same field events.

Phil Manuel, 6'1 1/2", 167 pounds, broke the American Royal pole vault record of 11'6 1/2" with his vault of 11'8" on February 10. Then returned the following week to smash his own record by going 12'2". During the first meet Vic Damon, 6'1", 175 pounds, shattered the shot put record of 50'6" with a heave of 53'2 1/2".

Breaking records is not a new experience for both juniors. Phil broke the National Junior Olympic pole vault record, and at the same time set a new school record, with a vault of 12'8". Vic established the record for the Kansas City Junior Olympics last summer. The future looks promising for both boys as no one else in the area has come close to their marks this year.

There is a definite parallel between the two Southwest amateurs and the world record holders and it will probably continue with each athlete topping his own mark—for records are made to be broken.

Indians Finish Low In Big Eight Meet

Southwest finished far down on the list of teams in the interscholastic section of the Big Eight held March 2 and 3 on the new thirty-thousand dollar track in the Municipal Auditorium. The Indians managed to send only three men into the finals on Saturday night. Rick Jeter finished fifth in the 60-yard low hurdles and George Cook captured the same spot in the 880. Terry Burk, who qualified in the 60-yard dash was unable to place in his event. Central won the high school part of the meet.

In the University section the fans were treated to an exciting dual between Kansas and Nebraska. The outcome was in doubt until the Jayhawks took first and tied for third in the pole vault, which happened to be the last event of the night. This enabled them to win by a margin of 11/12 of a point.

Jim Baker, who starred on the Southwest track teams of 1956, 57, and 58 and twice won the 440 in the state outdoor meet, took third in the quarter mile and led the University of Missouri mile relay team to a second place finish. Jim was beaten by the defending champion, Charles Strong, Oklahoma State, and Ted Woods, Colorado. Woods was on the United States Olympic team in Rome. This race was one of the most exciting of the evening and the time tied the record.

This was the final meet for Coach Ewing's crew before the state meet in Columbia on March 24-25.

Squad Offers Promise in Coming Season

Indians Possess Balance and Potential As Indicated by Pre-season Meets

If recent performances are any indication, the Southwest track team may offer a season filled with heartening surprises. In the American Royal program held on February 24th, the team edged out Central, last year's runner-up for the city championship, for a somewhat surprising victory.

Although Southwest finished eighth in the Big Eight Indoor meet, several individual performances looked promising. Rick Jeter and George Cook placed fifth in the finals of the 60-yard low hurdles and 880 yard run respectively. Terry Berk finished sixth in the 60 yard dash.

State Indoor Meet Next

The upcoming state indoor meet at Columbia will see Phil Manuel shooting for a record-breaking vault. Vic Damon will have an opportunity to flex his muscles against the state's finest shot putters. The cindermen will qualify for this meet by meeting qualifying times in competition previous to the state indoor meet.

The interclass track program will be held following the state indoor competition. At this time track coaches will look over possible prospects to round out this year's team. This school program will be followed by the first tri-meet to be held on April 5 against East and Central at East.

Many Bright Prospects

Coach Ewing admits that it is yet too early to evaluate this year's team. He looks for outstanding performances from Manuel and Damon and such promising sprinters as Terry Berk, Paul Duffendack, Craig Lewis, and Tom Smith. Distance runners will include George Cook in the 880, Jon Pollock and J. B. Wilkoff in the mile, and Kim Cavanaugh and Paul Duffendack will run the quarter mile. Rick Jeter and Tom Goodwin comprise the hurdlers. Several potential sophomores may also be included in this season's competition.

Squad Well Balanced

This year's squad possesses the balance that previous squad's have lacked. Fine individual performances will not be uncommon, but the team's ability to function as a unit is a question yet unanswered. The squad will be expected to take the dual meets while larger meets will present tougher competition. Thus, with fine potential and balance the 1962 squad will hustle toward what is hoped will be a fine league finish.

Senior Intramurals Begin

Senior intramurals started off with a bang as Tom Turner's Team beat Gary Lasister's Team 52-21. The defending champions were ahead from the start.

Led by Richard Weins with 15 points and Staley McDermet and Turner with 14 points each, the team showed a well-balanced attack and will probably be the team to beat again this year. High scorers for the losers were John Easton and Lasister with 6 points apiece.

In the other game a pair of Bills, Wade and Grisesel, of Mike Nichols team, made the difference. Teaming up at guard Grisesel ripped the cords for 19 points including 7 free throws. Wade, scoring on short jump shots and drives, netted 13 points. Jim Sneed's losing team was led by Eddie Owens with 3 points, as the final score was 46-9.

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
