Basketball Season Ahead

With the loss of practically all of last year's squad, Coach Tom Kipp is helping to build a strong basketball team centered around the few boys who are returning: Tom Smith, Bart Strother, Tom McCaffrey, Shane Davis, and Steve McLaughlin.

Coach Kipp feels that Southeast will probably be the toughest team in the Interscholastic League to beat. Van Horn, a much improved, well-balanced team, and Westport, with the return of most of its team, will also offer stiff competition. Coach Kipp added that because of the lack of depth, experience, and height, "We'll have to beat 'em with hustle and drive."

Backing up the Varsity will be the B-Team coached by Mr. Roger Wendell. During his college days, Coach Wendell was a cager himself at Tulsa University. Mr. Henry Morse, who played his college ball at Pittsburg State, will coach the freshmen this season.

TIME OUT

The man who catches most of Southwest passes, 50% to be exact, is 6' 3", 183 pound Tom Goodwin, the Indian's starting left end on offense and defense. He has caught 18 passes for 160 yards to date this season and as far as defense is concerned, the other teams just don't go around his end. Tom has been the iron man of the squad this year, averaging close to 42 minutes of play per game.

A newcomer to Southwest this year, Tom has surely been a welcome and pleasant surprise. He plans to attend West Virginia University where he will study law. As far as the games go, Tom's gripe is people who don't come to cheer the team on.

At right end this year are Carlton Crenshaw and Phil Jones. Carlton is a 6' 2", 170 pound junior in his third year of football at Southwest. He is a fine blocker and a real hawk on defense proven by his ability to smash through the line and drop the offensive ball carriers for losses.

He plans to attend Missouri, Colorado, or Northwestern Universities where he will study law and participate in football, basketball, and track. Carlton is a member of the Letterman's Club, C.C.C., and runs the quarter mile in track.

Phil Jones is the smallest of the three ends but by no means the little guy. His 6', 175 pound frame looks mighty big to other teams, while his alertness to diagnose the plays and be in the right place at the right time is invaluable. He is also an outstanding pass receiver.

Phil is planning to be a journalism major at Missouri where he is also going to play football. He is on the student council and a member of the activities committee.

Season's Finale with Rockhurst, Paseo Homecoming Against Paseo and Final Contest with Rockhurst, Long-Time Archrival, To Be Televised

The Indians are very fortunate this year as one of their games has already been televised and two more are scheduled to be. During the 1961 season, the Tribe has been a constant threat to nearly all of their opponents; yet, there have been certain factors hindering their climb to the top.

Indians To Vie with Paseo
 The next two games will mark the end of the football season. The game on November 11, against Paseo, will be the Southwest homecoming contest. Paseo has done poorly this year, but most of the misfortune has come through the loss of the three best players. The star backfield man, Jerry Porter, will be back against the Indians. The tribe should be able to win their homecoming with ease; yet upsets in this season have been quite common.

Rockhurst Desirous
 In the final game of the season, Southwest will meet the Rockhurst Hawks, as the Rockhurst team will be trying to regain the win after last year's 7-6 loss. Rockhurst started out well this year, rated number 4 in the area; however, injuries have hurt the Hawks as they have lost five of their starting team including their main yardage gainer, Jim Whitaker. Using an inexperienced quarterback, they have been shut-out two games in succession; the first, 47-0, and the second, 41-0. Still the Hawks will be fighting hard, but Southwest hopes to close out their season in a repeat performance of last year's game against Rockhurst.

Bishop Miege Too Tough in Close Game; Indians Drop Redbirds Easily, 34-15

Miege Drop Indians, 12-0
 Despite the 12-0 loss, the Indians looked unusually well against Kansas competition. The cold weather proved an aid to Greg Curtis as his passing was sharper than ever. In the first half the Indians drove to the goal line twice only to fail to score. The Indians actually stunned this very tough opponent from Kansas. Despite an injury to Ronnie Stewart and continual pounding of the Indian line by the giant Miege players, the Indians held their ground well. Passing provided the bulk of yardage for the Stags. Fortitude and endurance were displayed by the Indians.

Indians Scalp Redbirds, 34-15
 Southwest, holding eighth place, took on the last-place Manual Cardinals at the Southeast field on Saturday, October 28, and proceeded to take the victory, 34-15. Rain and wet grounds failed to hinder the Indians as they trounced the low-rated Cardinals, who were very fast.

Tribe Held in Start
 The Cardinals kicked-off to the Indians who were stopped after four downs and were forced to punt. Manual took the kick on the fifty and moved the ball to the 9, but were forced to attempt a field goal which was made, giving them 3 points. The Indians received the ball again, but lost it after returning for 60 yards. Pushed back by a penalty, Manual quick-kicked on the second down and presented the ball to the Indians as the quarter ended.

Lewis Breaks Loose
 Due to fine runs by Craig Lewis, the Indians scored two TD's in the second quarter. The first came with Curtis plunging from the 2 at the opening of the period after a quick, 33-yard march. Manual took control of the ball for most of the quarter, but their drive was halted by an intercepted pass on the 15. The Indians moved quickly and after a 26-yard run and a 25-yard pass from Curtis, Craig Lewis moved over the goal line for another TD.

Indians Dominate in Third
 Again Craig Lewis was responsible for a tally, when, after gaining 50 yards, Ronnie Stewart completed the drive running from the 12. After the kick-off to Manual, the Indians recovered a fumble and were set up again for the TD which was made by Curtis plunging from the 2.

Passing Good for Both Teams
 In a repeat performance, the Indians recovered a fumble soon after the kick-off and scored on a pass to Lewis from Jeter. With part of the second team playing for Southwest, Manual scored two TD's in succession due to fine passing and fast running. Passing also dominated the Indian's final attack as Rick Jeter completed two-thirds of his passes for a gain of 58 yards; but time ran out before a score could be made.
 Defensively and offensively, the Indians looked good. The elevated score gave Rick Jeter a chance to show some fine passing and the second-team offense to display their worth. The win was the second in six starts.
